

Why are Read Alouds important?

Give Students the opportunity to:

- Listen to a fluent reader
- Hear stories they would not be able to read on their own
- Hear rich vocabulary
- Build their background knowledge
- Hear comprehension strategies being used




Give Teachers the opportunity to:

- Model fluency
- Introduce and model comprehension strategies
- Introduce vocabulary
 - Build students' background knowledge

Why use Read Alouds?


- There is much research that promotes the importance of Read Alouds.
- It is crucial to read aloud in the primary grades.
- To help these students develop a love for reading.
- To show them that reading is a priority and to model just how important it is!
- It is our duty to give them opportunities to go to places they wouldn't otherwise be able to go!

Make Reading Important!

Reading Logs (Teacher-kept/Independent)

Use a Reward System – Ideas:

- Keep a chart visible & progress-tracking
- Celebrate their accomplishment (every 5/10 earn a Star sticker & star on chart)
- School money (for each book/chapter)
- Pointer Club
- Bell Club
- Free book (donations/book swap or grants)
- Time with a Reading Buddy/Flashlight reading
- Lunch Buddies lunch with you



One Book, One School

- One week Christmas & Read Across America
- All Teachers in Building read the book aloud to their class
- Activities to tie the school together





Polar Express

- Movie/Hot Cocoa
- Hide a train in the cafeteria each day – kids find it
- All children make a bell necklace
- Each class does a writing response activity for the book
